

Don't Become Your Enemy

A Lesson in Rest

- 1. One of the greatest ways to defeat your enemy is to not become your enemy. Don't take on their attitudes.
- 2. David was naïve about his many enemies and problems:
 - a. "Why does my father overlook me?"
 - b. "Why are my brothers angry to me?"
 - c. "Why is King Saul treating me this way?"
 - d. "Why is my son trying to overthrow me?"
 - e. "Why did my closest friend raise his heel against me?"
 - f. "Why does prosperity for a righteous man take so long?"
- 3. You can fret over your enemies so much for prospering that eventually you give up and take on their ways (Psalm 37:1-2).
 - a. We ask, "why do bad things happen to good people?"
 - b. David asked, "why do good things happen to good people?" "Why do the wicked prosper?"
 - c. David had to work at not being naïve about people.
 - d. You can come to a point where you say, "I've done everything right and got nowhere. So why fight it?"
 - e. Low paid police face this when arresting criminals and often, eventually steal easy money.
- 4. It would be easy for David to personally take revenge (Romans 12:19).
 - a. Revenge will eat you up and create bitterness.
 - b. When you give your problems to the Lord, you turn loose of them.
 - c. You can live your life and know God will take care of your situation.
 - d. One of the greatest ways to place anger on the head of your enemy is to treat your problems with apathy.
 - 1. "I don't care. I will let God take the care."
 - 2. If the problem is in God's hands, your enemies cannot provoke you.
 - 3. When God is in control, you are at peace.
 - 4. Not thinking of your enemy is a great weapon.
 - 5. To think too much about your enemy means your thoughts are controlling you.
- 5. Give your worries to the Lord then rest on His promises (Psalm 55:22, Proverbs 3:5-7, Isaiah 23:12, Matthew 11:28-29).
- 6. Jesus rested during a storm while the disciples fretted.

- 7. Paul was betrayed by Alexander the coppersmith and many of his personal friends. In each case, he turned each one over to the Lord so he could continue (2 Timothy 4:13-16).
