## The Sixth Saying

After Jesus had received the vinegar He said, "It is finished" (John 19:30).

# Jesus Fulfilled Both the Law and the Prophets

"Do not think that I came to destroy the Law or the Prophets. I did not come to destroy but to fulfill" (Matthew 5:17).

"In burnt offerings and sacrifices for sin You had no pleasure. Then I said, "Behold I have come in the volume of the book it is written of Me to do Your will, O God" (Hebrews 10:6-7).

- 1. The prophets who spoke of and showed His coming (Luke 18:31).
  - a. The coats of skins for Adam, Eve, and Abel's lamb. Jesus clothed us with salvation and righteousness.
  - b. The ark of Noah. Jesus is our shelter from storm.
  - c. Abraham offered Isaac but killed the ram. God should have sacrificed us, but Jesus substituted.
  - d. The blood on the doorposts protected Israel. We are protected from the destroyer by Jesus' blood.
  - e. The Passover lamb told of Jesus, the Lamb of God.
- 2. The Law

"Christ has redeemed us from the curse of the law, having become a curse for us (for it is written, "Cursed is everyone who hangs on a tree")" (Galatians 3:13).

- a. The serpent on the pole. Jesus on the cross. Our sin and sickness taken by Him from us.
- b. The sacrifices no longer needed to be offered (Hebrews 10:1-4, 18).

### Redeemed from the Curse of the Law

"When Jesus had received the sour wine, He said, "It is finished!" (John 19:30)

- It is finished "telew" FINISHED.
- 2. This was not a cry of the completion of all things.
  - a. His suffering was not finished.
  - b. Salvation was not finished.
  - c. His completed work was not finished.

- d. Jesu finished different parts of His ministry at different times.
- e. He finished His ministry works before the cross (John 17:4).
- f. Even after resurrection, He still had more to do (John 20:17).
- g. Redemption was finished at His ascension. But the plan of the ages is still to be completed (Hebrews 1:3, 13).
- 3. Jesus meant the Law was fulfilled it was over.
  - a. Jesus was made under the law to redeem those under the law (Galatians 4:4).
  - b. Jesus did not come to destroy the law or the prophets. He did not come to destroy but to fulfill.
- 4. Jesus fulfilled:
  - a. All scriptures, prophecies of His coming, and work up to the cross.
  - b. All laws and sacrifices under the law of Moses.
- 5. The laws and sacrifices had been fulfilled in Jesus. They were no longer necessary for sinners' salvation or believer's spirituality.
  - a. The path to God for sinner's salvation is now the Mediator, Jesus Christ.
  - b. The path to God for saints for forgiveness is now the High Priest, Arbitrator, Jesus Christ.
- 6. Jesus did not drink the sour wine to dull the pain, but in our place, as a symbol of the bitter taste of our inability to keep the law.

### At Jesus' Death

- 1. The veil separating man from God was removed by Jesus' death.
  - a. The cloth veil was torn as a sign.
  - b. The law was removed. Man was reconciled to God.
- 2. The real scapegoat was sent out on the Day of Atonement, and would never be sent again.
