

Standing on the Rock - The Word and Prayer

"Whoever hears these sayings of Mine, and does them, I will liken him to a wise man who built his house on the rock: and the rain descended, the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house; and it did not fall, for it was founded on the rock.

"But everyone who hears these sayings of Mine, and does not do them, will be like a foolish man who built his house on the sand: and the rain descended, the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house; and it fell. And great was its fall." (Matthew 7:24-27)

Prayer is for Fellowship With God and to Change Things

- 1. Prayer is speaking to God (Acts 9:11).
- 2. "Pray without ceasing" (Romans 1:9). Be open always to God's leading.
- 3. Jesus called prayers of the unrighteous "...vain repetitions...much speaking" (Matthew 6:7). Jesus said to not be like them (Matthew 6:8).
- 4. We want our prayers to count.
- 5. "Be doers of the word and not hearers only..." James 1:22
 - a. Prayer is a major way of being a doer of the word of God.
 - b. The word is our directory for prayer, "...out of the abundance of the heart..."

How Does the Word Profit Prayer?

- 1. The word teaches us the importance of prayer.
 - a. Most Christians pray little. They offer many excuses for not.
 - b. Many say they do not have time to pray. They are too busy.
 - c. Jesus was the busiest of men, yet he found time to pray.
 - 1. The synagogue was a place for teaching of the word.
 - 2. The temple was called the "house of prayer."
 - 3. In our personal lives, we need a synagogue and a temple.
 - d. "Watch (be alert, expectant) and pray, so you won't enter temptation" (Mark 14:38).

- e. "In every situation by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God" (Philippians 4:6).
- f. "...Shall God not avenge His own elect who cry out day and night to Him..." (Luke 18:7).
- 2. The word teaches us we do not always know how to pray.
 - a. "We do not know what we should pray for as we ought, but the Spirit Himself makes intercession [g]for us with groanings (Romans 8:26).
 - b. This passage was written by Paul, the smartest man in the New Testament.
 - c. We need the Holy Spirit's help by praying in tongues.
 - d. The most powerful prayer is not tongues but praying the Word.
 - e. The limitations of the human mind and even the written word are overcome by praying in the Spirit.
 - f. We need to ask the Lord, as the disciples did, "Lord teach us to pray..." (Luke 11:1).
- 3. The word teaches us the surety of answered prayer, faith.
 - a. "Ask and it shall be given you" (Matthew 7:7).
 - b. "If two of you agree on earth concerning anything that they ask, it will be done for them by My Father in heaven" (Matthew 18:19).
 - c. "Whatever things you ask when you pray, believe that you receive them, and you will have them" (Mark 11:24).
 - d. "Now this is the confidence that we have in Him, that if we ask anything according to His will, He hears us" (1 John 5:14).
- 4. The word teaches us the goal of prayer.
 - a. "You ask and do not receive, because you ask amiss, that you may spend it on your pleasures" (James 4:3).
 - b. We need the help of the Holy Spirit to reveal our hidden sins.
 - 1. "Cleanse me from my secret faults" (Psalm 19:12).
 - 2. "Search me, O God, and know my heart; try me, and know my anxieties; and see if there is any wicked way in me and lead me in the way everlasting (Psalm 139:23-24).
 - 3. "Behold, You desire truth in the inward parts, and in the hidden part You will make me to know wisdom (Psalm 51:6).

- c. The greatest use of prayer is to be a blessing to others. "...Whatever you do, do all to the glory of God" (1 Corinthians 10:31).
 - 1. Our forgiveness should lead us to forgiving others.
 - 2. Healing should lead us to praying for others to be healed.
 - 3. Prosperity should lead us to give into the lives of others.
- 5. The word teaches us to recognize different types of prayer.
 - a. "Supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks" (1 Timothy 2:1).
 - b. "I will pray with the spirit, and I will also pray with the understanding" (1 Corinthians 14:15).
 - c. Some of God's promises are general rather than specific. Some are conditional.

 Others are unconditional. Some are fulfilled in this life, others in the world to come.
- 6. The word teaches us our position in prayer.
 - a. God is powerful. In ourselves we are powerless.
 - b. Arrogance has no place in prayer. We come before God in full and complete submission.
 - c. Even Jesus prayer "Nevertheless, not as I will but as You will."
 - d. "Come boldly before the throne of grace..." (Hebrews 4:6).
 - e. "Let us draw nearer with a true heart... (Hebrews 10:22).
 - f. "Seek the Lord all you meek of the earth..." (Zephaniah 2:3).
