 - b. Neither sin nor other people made you fall.
 - c. The devil did not make you do it.
 - d. Turning toward right is your choice. You then begin winning.
- 2. The Bible is filled with winners and losers. God has told you how to win (Micah 6:8).
 - a. Following the word consistently brings success and maturity.
 - b. Following the leadership of the Holy Spirit also brings success.
- 3. In our country, political correctness says we have no winners and losers, first, and last place.
 - a. We cannot all be winners.
 - b. But winners can inspire losers to reevaluate, learn, and now win.
 - c. We cannot all be winners for just showing up.
- 4. Even in heaven there are winners and losers, rewards for finishing well, and loss of rewards for not.

- 5. Don't feel guilty because you succeeded.
 - a. In the Christian life, anyone who obeys God can and will succeed.
 - b. In our country, anyone who follows rules, does not give up, can win.

Whether You Win or Lose, Keep the Right Attitude

- 1. Your win did not cause someone else to fail. You caused your win.
- 2. Your loss was not caused by the winner. You caused your loss.
- 3. Guilt in the winners has caused the contestant field to be reduced and your odds are now better, so try harder.
- 4. You can either resign to failure or take it as a challenge to improve.
- 5. It is not the coach's job to put your son on the field to let him play.
 - a. It is the father's job to teach him at home and bring ups the skills so he can play.
 - b. The coach is looking for a winning team and your child can train and enter as a winner.
- 6. God put the blame on Cain for Cain's failure.
 - a. He did not ask Abel to back off and not try so hard next time.
 - b. Cain's anger and pouting was his fault, not Abel's or God's.
 - c. Abel did not need to feel guilty for pleasing God.
- 7. God told Cain he could return with the right gift, the right way, and God would accept it.
 - a. God always makes a way for forgiveness and restoration.
 - b. Accepting responsibility for our actions and choices are the beginning of turning failure into success.
- 8. Athletes everywhere, throughout the years, have grown stronger by recognizing their failures and learning from the winners.
- 9. After a race, two things usually happen to the loser's advantage:
 - a. The winner rests on his victory.
 - b. The loser can get over shock and sorrow and learn from the loss.
